## 2nd Bombardment Association President, 2012 to 2013



## Charlie Brown's B-17 - A Remarkable Story

Look carefully at the photo of the B-17 and note how shot up it is - one engine is dead; the tail, horizontal stabilizer, and nose are shot up. It looks like it is ready to fall out of the sky. (This is a painting done by an artist from the description of both pilots many years later.) Then realize that flying next to it is a German ME-109 fighter. Now read the story below. I think you'll be surprised.....



Charlie Brown was a B-17 Flying Fortress pilot with the 379th Bomb Group at Kimbolton, England. His B-17 was called 'Ye Old Pub' and was heavily damaged, having been hit by flak and fighters. The compass was damaged which caused them to fly deeper over enemy territory instead of heading home to Kimbolton. After the B-17 flew over an enemy airfield, a German pilot named Franz Steigler was ordered to take off and shoot down the B-17. When he got near the B-17, he could not believe his eyes. In his words, he 'had never seen a plane in such a bad state'. The tail and rear section was severely damaged, and the tail gunner wounded. The top gunner was all over the top of the fuselage. The nose was smashed and there were holes everywhere. Despite having ammunition, Franz flew to the side of the B-17 and looked at Charlie Brown, the pilot. Brown was scared and struggling to control his damaged and blood-stained plane.

Aware that they had no idea where they were going, Franz waved at Charlie to turn 180 degrees. Franz escorted and guided the stricken plane to, and slightly over, the North Sea towards England. He then saluted Charlie Brown and turned away, back to Europe. When Franz landed he told the CO that the plane had been shot down over the sea. and never told the truth to anybody. Charlie Brown and the remains of his crew told all at their briefing, but were ordered never to talk about it.

More than 40 years later, Charlie Brown wanted to find the Luftwaffe pilot who saved the crew. After years of research, Franz was found. He had never talked about the incident, not even at post-war reunions. They met in the USA at a 379th Bomber Group reunion, together with 25 people who are alive now - all because Franz never fired his guns that day.

When asked why he didn't shoot them down, Stigler later said, "I didn't have the heart to finish those brave men. I flew beside them for a long time. They were trying desperately to get home and I was going to let them

do that. I could not have shot at them. It would have been the same as shooting at a man in a parachute." Both men died in 2008.

## Fifteenth Air Force

The Fifteenth was established in November 1943 as part of the United States Army Air Forces in the World War II Mediterranean Theater of Operations. The first commander was General Jimmy Doolittle. In its eighteen months of existence the 15th AF, operating principally from airfields in southern Italy, destroyed all gasoline production within its range in Southern Europe; knocked out all the major aircraft factories in its sphere; and destroyed 6,282 enemy aircraft in the air and on the ground.

The Fifteenth dropped 303,842 tons of bombs on enemy targets in 12 countries of Europe. Its combat personnel made 148,955 heavy bomber sorties and 87,732 fighter sorties against the enemy. The most vital of the Fifteenth's operations was the Ploesti, Romania complex of oil refineries, which contributed about 30% of the entire Axis oil supply. The cost was 237 heavies (15 of them RAF) and 39 escort fighters. More than 2,200 American Airmen were lost. But the results were good. At the end of the campaign the refineries were reduced to only 10% of their normal rate of activity. Production of aircraft declined from 650 to 250 per month. The 15th was also attacking enemy communications and transportation systems far behind enemy lines.

A unique sidelight of 15th's operations had been the rescue and repatriation of air crews shot down in enemy territory. No other air force has undertaken escape operations in so many countries. The Fifteenth returned 5,650 personnel by air, surface vessel and on foot through enemy lines. In more than 300 planned "reunion" operations men were safely brought back from Italy, Tunisia, France, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Hungary, Greece, Albania, Bulgaria, Rumania & Yugoslavia.

## Honor Flight Recognized by National Aviation Hall of Fame

Honor Flight Network joins the ranks of Earth orbiting and moon walking astronauts, the Tuskegee Airmen and the Doolittle Tokyo Raiders at the National Aviation Hall of Fame. The organization that flies veterans to Washington, D.C., from throughout the nation to tour monuments and memorials in the nation's capital was chosen for the Milton Caniff "Spirit of Aviation" award, the Aviation Hall of Fame has announced. "Just to even mention us for the same award is so humbling I cannot believe we are going to be joining those ranks," said Earl Morse, founder of Honor Flight. "It is so humbling for all of us in the program."

Honor Flight first took wing in 2005 when six planes flew a dozen World War II veterans out of the Springfield-Buckley Municipal Airport to Washington, D.C., to see the memorial to the war they served in. Since then, the program based in Springfield has expanded exponentially. Honor Flight has flown about 100,000 veterans from nearly 120 "hubs" to Washington, D.C., since the first flight lifted off from the Miami Valley, said Morse of Honor Flight. "It's speaks loud and clear to the commitment of thousands of volunteers across the nation that are doing everything we can to get veterans to their memorial before they pass away," the physician's assistant and Air Force retiree said.

Honor Flight received the award Dec. 17, 2012, at an Aviation Trail Inc. ceremony honoring the 109th anniversary of the Wright Brothers first flight at Kitty Hawk in North Carolina. "It's been a huge campaign and so many veterans and their families have benefited from it and continue to," said Ron Kaplan, National Aviation Hall of Fame enshrinement director. "They really are a worthy group to be added to that roster." The Hall of Fame has given the award every year since 1981.
